

Dean of School


Aleksandar Novakovic was born in 1975 in the town of Rudo, Republic of Serbs. After finishing elementary school, Aleksandar was accepted to St. Sava Seminary in Belgrade where he graduated in 1995. In 1996, with the blessing of His Holiness Patriarch Pavle, he started his undergraduate studies at the St. Sava School of Theology in Libertyville, Illinois. Upon graduation from St. Sava, Aleksandar enrolled in master theological studies at the St. Vladimir Seminary in Scarsdale, New York where he graduated in 2002.

Aleksandar Novakovic returned to monastery St. Sava, Libertyville, Illinois upon graduation and started working as a librarian at a St. Sava School of Theology. His Eminence Metropolitan Christopher ordained Aleksandar Novakovic into a rank of Deacon in October of 2003 at the St. Basil Church in Lake Forest, Illinois. He served at St. Basil's church, as a Deacon, until he was ordained into the rank of Presbyter on St. Aleksandar Nevski, in September of 2004. After ordination, Father Aleksandar served at the St. Sava Monastery and occasionally at other Chicago area churches. In mean time, his responsibilities at St. Sava Seminary grew to a position of school's Dean of Students, in 2003, the school secretary in 2004, and the position of teaching Church Mission course at St. Sava School of Theology in 2006.

With the blessings of His Eminence Metropolitan Christopher, Fr. Aleksandar continued his education at the St. Mary of Lake University in Mundelein, where he took classes towards his Doctorate Degree in Pastoral Theology. He completed two years Doctor of

The beautiful St. Sava Monastery, was founded by St. Bishop Mardarije in 1925, in Libertyville, Illinois. Mission Statement

The St. Sava School of Theology has as its main mission and goal to provide religious education and to train candidates who are from the United States and Canada and from other countries for the Holy Priesthood in the Serbian Orthodox Church specifically, and for interested individuals of other ethnic jurisdictions of the Orthodox Christian Faith. The school functions as the educational center for individuals committed to serving the Serbian Orthodox Church and her people in a multi-lingual environment. Initially, the school provides quality baccalaureate level study in Theology leading to the Bachelor of Divinity Degree as approved and as uniquely required for the Serbian Orthodox Church both for resident full-time students and parttime students. Our Mission is to serve the Serbian Orthodox Church by providing the highest level of education to our students. To serve the needs of the Church more fully, we also recognize the need to provide, in addition to academic education, also human, spiritual, and pastoral formation. We accomplish our mission by integrating these four elements, thus successfully preparing students for service to the Church and its needs: clergy, missionaries, iconographers, choir directors, educators, and laity.

Short-term objectives of the Institution

The initial strategy in establishing this institution was to form relationships with existing Schools of Theology. St. Sava School of Theology applied for and received a Charter from the Holy Assembly of Bishops and of the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Serbian Orthodox Church, and has completed the necessary requirements to meet the criteria for Operating Authority in Ilinois. On that basis the School has also received the authority to grant the Bachelor of Divinity Degree. The Institution by nature is to be a small one, with a specialized program for students interested in the priesthood, and/or for preparation for advanced studies in Orthodox Christian Theology. Facilities have been secured for housing and boarding of students, classroom

space, and beginnings of the specialized library. Cooperative programs with other Theological schools, library usage, and exchanging of instructors have been planned. The School is structured to operate its program, in accordance with the American plan now being followed to comply with the State Board of Higher Educational requirements.

Funding is provided by an annual budget proposed by the School and adopted and implemented by the Board of Trustees and Holy Synod of the Serbian Orthodox Church. As the needs of the School grow, the budget is adjusted accordingly. Financial support is sought from all the Dioceses and Church Congregations comprising the Church.

Academic Control

Board of Trustees (Directors). The Governing Board of the institution, known as the Board of Trustees, is to be comprised of seven (7) Trustees (Directors). The Board of Trustees will have an Executive Committee to function in intervals between Board of Trustees meetings, to conduct such business of the School as the Trustees authorize. The Board of Trustees shall have a Finance Committee to exercise general supervision over the School's finances for the support and maintenance of the School. The Board of Trustees will exercise the responsibilities of overseeing that the School plant, Faculty, Student body and school finances are properly functioning as provided for by the laws and ordinances of the School and, as may be required by relevant Church, academic, and civil authorities organization. The design and conduct of the degree program is that which is prescribed by the Holy Synod of the Serbian Orthodox Church and approved by the Holy Assembly of Bishops for general theological curriculum requirements.

The Faculty Council is responsible for implementation of the approved degree requirements from authorities of Higher Education of the State of Illinois. The school will seek membership in the Association of Theological Schools in order to assure that the quality of the program will be maintained. Student evaluations will be made in the Spring of the Sophomore and Junior years and in the Fall of the Senior year. The process is intended to help students determine their own vocational decision with the aid of a career assessment program. This decision will be supplemented by the faculty's evaluation and decision on whether to support the student's candidacy for ordination. There is also a process of internship diagnosis, carried out in the context of the Teaching Parish Teams, designed to help students recognize the ministerial areas in which they need to grow. A post-internship review involves the faculty's evaluation of the student's general fitness for the ministry.

The Dormitory, Classrooms and Refectory of the School of Theology are housed in the St. Sava and New Gracanica Monastery Camp Building during the School year. Other facilities are located in various locations on the Monastery ground. Facilities consist of the following:

- a) Large red building with a large commons-dinner hall, kitchen, recreation room, class-rooms, dorm rooms for student housing, student lounge and office.
- b) Church for worship c) A frame Library building with three areas for bookshelves, catalog room with computer
 - and one room office.

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Dormitory & Church Life

All full-time students reside in the school dormitory and are expected to abide by the school rules regulating all aspects of student life. While at St. Sava, students are responsible for the proper maintenance of cleanliness in the dorm, the Church and the Sanctuary, dining room assistance and other duties as assigned. Responsibilities are assigned by the Dean of Students, who monitors student life and activities on the campus. He is responsible for the weekly schedule of cantors, as well as students regular attendance at all worship services. He coordinates dining room assistance schedules, inspects student rooms and all other facilities used by students. Professors and students are actively involved in the church life of the Serbian Orthodox Church, especially in the Midwestern Diocese. Matins and Vespers are served daily at St. Sava and New Gracanica Monastery, as well as Vigils and Divine Liturgies according to the Church Calendar. The students preach at services in the Midwestern Diocese and also give concerts of sacred music. During the summer, and when possible, the student chorus travels to other Dioceses on concert tours in behalf of the school. The student chorus has released its first CD of sacred music for distribution among the parishes for the benefit of the School.

School Finances

The School Fiscal Year runs from January 1st to December 31st, in order to coincide with the National Church's fiscal year for the proposed budget purposes. The School receives no government or private grants. Church congregations and other local church organizations contribute annually to the Theological School Foundation Fund which supplements the budget of the school in accordance with the adopted budget. Other sources of income are from private voluntary donations and contributions to the Student Aid Fund for scholarships.

Financial Aid

Financial aid is available only to students preparing for ordination to the priesthood. Stipends are considered loans by the School pending ordination and Church service after graduation. Applicants in need of school loans should submit applications if qualified to the School Financial Aid office no later than the 10th of July.

Only those transfer credits which are compatible with this School's program shall be counted towards graduation. Incomplete grade can remain on student's record for one semester only, following the semester in which it was received. Failure to remove the incomplete by the end of the probationary semester will result in an automatic grade of F. Only one makeup exam is permitted in any failed course within two weeks of the end of the semester. Failure of the makeup exam requires that the course be repeated and passed without any makeup exams. Such repeated failure will result in dismissal from the School. If a student demonstrates poor performance during the first semester, such student will be placed on probation for the following semester, or else be required to withdraw from further study. Continued enrollment for a student on probation will depend on his overall performance for the full school year. Persons wishing to audit courses should be properly registered. Further student evaluations are done during the Spring semester of the second and third year, as well as the Fall of the fourth year. This process is intended to help the students determine their own vocational decisions with the aid of a career assessment program. Evaluations are further supplemented by the faculty's recommendations on whether to support the student's candidacy for ordination. Parish Practicum is evaluated in context of the Parish Teaching Team. Post internship review involves the final evaluation of the student's general fitness for the ministry. Official transcripts are only issued directly to other academic institutions. Requests may be made in writing or in person. No telephone requests will be accepted. Students may request an unofficial transcript from the Registrar's office for a fee of \$50.00.

Admission Requirements

Admission requirements for the School of Theology include: graduation from High School, Junior College, college, or a Middle Orthodox Seminary, with grades of A and B, or grade point average of 3.0, and the passing of an entrance examination.

The Bachelor of Divinity Degree Requirements

- a) The number of Credits accepted by transferring from other institutions will be determined by the nature of the other institution, and whether the courses being submitted are the equivalent of courses offered at this School. The transferring student shall be required to complete the prescribed curriculum of this school and full credit will be awarded for the same language courses.
- b) Life experience credits will be determined by evaluation of work done in Church service that is relevant to program objectives and appropriate to courses offered, such as liturgical chant with rubrics, administration, and a satisfactory proficiency in the languages offered by this school.
- c) Proficiency examination credits will be accepted only for liturgical chant, rubrics, and languages offered by this school, and the courses will be waived if the candidate shows a proficiency of a grade of B or higher.
- d) The grade point average for advancement and graduation is 2.50.
- e) The residency requirement for all full-time students is four years. Transfer students and special students who have to be evaluated must satisfy a minimum of one year's residency, or more as required, to satisfy all requirements for graduation.
- f) The time limit for completion of the program is four years.
- g) A certificate from the School Librarian that all library books have been returned must be submitted.
- h) Every student will be graded annually for attendance and participation at daily and festal worship services. The grade will be shown in the transcript under practicum. Failure will be taken into account as to whether the student will continue studies. Only one make-up exam is allowed two weeks after finals. The course must be repeated with passing grade with no makeup exam for graduation.



IN MEMORY OF METROPOLITAN IRENEY & NEW GRACANICA MONASTERY - ST. SAVA SERBI-AN ORTHODOX SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY RESIDENCE AND DORMITORY OFFICE

In the academic year of 2024, our Serbian Orthodox Church commemorates the 40th anniversary of the New Gracanica Monastery and its founder, the late Metropolitan Iriney. Completed and consecrated in 1984, the New Gracanica Church, along with its main building dedicated to the feast of the "Protection of the Most Holy Mother of God," stands as an impressive architectural replica of the old Gracanica of Kosovo. Notably, it is eighteen percent larger than the 1321 structure in Serbia.

The visionary behind this church and complex was the late Metropolitan Iriney, who served as Bishop of the Diocese from 1963 until his passing in 1999. He is interred on the right-hand side of the church. His successor, the Rt. Rev. Bishop LONGIN, currently leads the New Gracanica - Midwestern American Diocese, part of the Serbian Orthodox Church headquartered in Belgrade, Serbia, under the leadership of His Holiness Patriarch Porfirie.



The Diocesan complex includes an administration/seminary building, architecturally complementing the church and forming a cross when viewed from above. This building serves multiple purposes, catering to the diverse needs of the religious community.

Among its features are cells for monastics, rooms for students, dormitory and dining facilities for a children's camp, the Central Diocesan Office, the Bishop's office, meeting/conference rooms, the Diocesan Education Department's office, the Diocesan Observer's office, a museum showcasing art and artifacts from native Serbia, a Diocesan Bookstore, and the Joe Buley Memorial Library.
